Twenty-seven-year-old Ntiyiso Sambo is an electrical engineer and a graduate intern in Vametco's electrical engineering department. She successfully completed her BTECH in electrical engineering in 2018.

Her current role involves assisting the electrical foreman with tasks such as project planning, costing, equipment changes, electrical projects and being responsible for stores.

She is particularly proud of her involvement in the building of the project ball mill substation where she was mentored and given some responsibilities in the planning, buying and project management process.

Not allowing tough circumstances to dampen her spirit or her work ethic, Ntiyiso is very clear about what she wants for her future in mining. She is very optimistic about her future, and she believes she can grow into more senior roles at the mine.

She urges young people interested in an engineering career to take full advantage of every training opportunity that is offered to them while they are studying or as interns. She would also like to see Vametco investing in a formal Junior Engineers Programme, which could focus on practical training and mentorship for new interns and apprentices.

She used the time to learn more about careers at the mine and she believes that the projects she did with her peers and the interactions with senior engineers during that time kept her motivated and gave her the confidence to pursue her career goals.
